


## Bird Identification Tips

#### Size & Shape

 You can place birds into size categories based on common objects (phone, loaf of bread, etc.) or common birds



- Whether the bird is stocky or thin, has a crest, has long or short legs, etc. can help narrow it down (i.e. sparrows are stockier while warblers are thinner)
- Focus on the shape of the bill, tail, or feet.
  - Bill shape can help clue you into what family the bird belongs to
  - Bill size can help distinguish similar species like hairy and downy woodpeckers!

#### **Colors & Patterns**

- Pay attention to the primary colors, location of color patches, presence of wing bars, eye stripes, streaks, or spots
- Look at the color of the bill, legs, and feet



- Note whether the call is buzzy or clear, fast or slow, high or low pitched
- Call patterns can be remembered with some common mnemonics

#### **Behavior**

- Observe how the bird moves through the landscape
  - Soaring, flitting through a tree, perching, hopping on the ground
  - Some birds may have distinctive behaviors (i.e. eastern phoebes will tail wag)
- Flight pattern
  - o Different groups of birds have distinctive flight patterns
    - Woodpeckers have undulating flight, raptors soar, etc.

### Range / Season / Habitat

- Migratory birds like warblers may only be in VA for a few months each year
- Some birds like cardinals or bluebirds can be found in VA year round
- VA has many diverse habitats like wetlands, forests, and grasslands, that host their own groups of birds!
